Cascadia is also more suitable than a sailboat for people who have mobility issues. "A catamaran is extremely stable," says co-owner Maureen Gordon. "She carries landing craft for going ashore, not zodiacs, so the bow can be dropped right onto the beach and people just walk off."

She accommodates up to 24 guests in 12 luxurious cabins, with a crew of 10. A Haida elder travels along to help guests learn the local culture and history.

culture and history.

The ship's kitchens are restaurant-grade. "The food was excellent and beautiful," says past passenger Peggy H. (she gave her full name but didn't want it published) from Ontario. "They even had wine pairings with the local fish that was caught that day."

For Peggy, the highlight of her Haida Gwaii journey was a visit to a UNESCO World Heritage Site in the remote islands of SGang Gwaay, where the ruins of houses and memorial poles illustrate the ancient Haida relationship to the

in search of the rare "spirit bear." Onboard naturalists and First Nations guides based onshore help identify the best bear viewing opportunities. Along the way, passengers explore fiords, watch for whales and take guided hikes through one the world's largest

### PACIFIC COASTAL CRUISES: LODGE-TO-LODGE CRUISING

If sleeping on a boat for a week is not for you, Pacific Coastal Cruises  $offers\, an\, alternative\, with\, three\, and\,$ four-night voyages that combine daytime cruising with overnight stays at wilderness lodges.

"Guests get to sleep in comfort-able lodges, so they can enjoy onshore activities, meet locals and learn first-hand about First Nations cultures," says owner George Bartel. Guests stay at Klahoose Wilderness Resort at Homfray Channel, the deluxe Sonora Resort in the Discovery Islands, Telegraph Cove Resort on the Johnstone Strait, and Black Rock Resort in Ucluelet.

During the day, the company's 28-m yacht, Pacific Bear II, carries 16 passengers from lodge to lodge, taking time to watch for seals and humpbacks in the Homfray Channel, bears in Toba Inlet or Blind Channel, or to go ashore for hiking and beachcombing. Different activities are available at each lodge. The newly renovated ship has walk-around decks, indoor and outdoor viewing lounges, a dining room and a bar. Breakfasts and lunches are served onboard, and dinners are at the lodges. Departures starting in spring

2024 run from \$2,250 to \$4,750, with sailings departing Powell River, Port McNeill, Port Alberni, or Nanaimo, depending on the itinerary.

CARGO CRUISING
Tag along on a 41-m cargo ship operated by Marine Link Tours as she delivers essential supplies where roads don't go: coils of cable to remote lumber camps, new windows to off-grid homes, a busted float plane to be repaired, and luxury items to the fly-in hideaways of the rich and famous.

For those living or working in the Broughton Archipelago or around the spectacular Bute Inlet and Toba Inlet, the Aurora Explorer is a vital lifeline. As a working ship it follows an ever-changing delivery schedule to places few people ever





go. Often the ship will stop just for passenger fun – to hike, swim, visit a historical site or feel the spray of a towering waterfall.

The custom-built vessel is like a  $floating flatbed\,truck\,with\,a\,ramp\,at\\the\,bow\,that\,can\,drop\,directly\,onto$ shore to disgorge freight or passengers. The six passenger cabins have twin beds and ensuite bathrooms. A large room with encircling windows serves as dining room, library and lounge. A talented chef creates meals that rival dining on a cruise ship. From the grill come burgers, salmon, halibut and honey-glazed ribs. Wine is included.

Sailings for 2023 are sold out, and they are booking for 2024. Five-night voyages are \$3,465 to \$4,250 departing from Menzies





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
